Experimental design using Amazon Mechanical Turk

- Designed two online surveys on Amazon Mechanical Turk, collected and analyzed data from 100 participants.
- Measured the judgment differences between definite and indefinite noun phrases using paired Wilcoxon tests.
- Results provide additional quantitative support for a classic linguistic finding that definite and indefinite noun phrases differ in whether they can be evaluated in a time different from its immediate containing context.
